FOREWORD

"And when we call for education, we mean real education, we believe in work. We ourselves are workers but work is not necessarily education. Education is the development of power and ideal. We want our children trained as intelligent human beings should be, and we will fight for all time against any proposal to educate black boys and girls simply as servants and underlings, or simply for the use of other people. They have a right to know, to think, to aspire."

-W.E.B. DuBois, 1906 Resolution of the Niagara Movement

My personal appreciation to Gary for this important publication and to Carol Cubia for her clerical assistance and Geraldine Graham for her editorial and clerical assistance. It is our hope that black students will find BLACK PROFILES helpful as they attempt to use resources in the ways of DuBois—"to know, to think, to aspire."


Al is a very good friend and very approachable. Next time you are in North Foundation, stop by Al's office to introduce yourself.

Kevin's interests include criminal justice and politics and he has done work for the Red Cross and March of Dimes. His hobbies include basketball, reading and dancing.




ROBERT L. DONALD Associate Professor of English 522 Wilson Hall 377-2266







If you are having an academic problem or need some personal counseling, come by the Special Programs Office and talk with Mr. Hurst—before you get into trouble.




ANTHONY JOHNSON

When he's not busily running around, you can find Tony in the Department of Special Programs offices.




BYRON JOHNSON


RICARDO JORDON


